NORTHERN FRIENDS PEACE BOARD Peace Round Up & Edinburgh Meeting 28 June

The latest Peace Round Up from Northern Friends Peace Board has been circulated by email. It is a good way of keeping uo to date with war & peace issues. Included is the text of the recent Quaker statement on Palestine which says:

'The UK is <u>reportedly</u> in discussions with France and Saudi Arabia over the recognition of a Palestinian state.

As David Lammy says, "It is unacceptable for any group of people to have lived with no state for longer than I've been alive."

In 2014, the UK parliament voted to recognise Palestine. Since then, no government has taken that step.

With the Israeli government pushing full steam ahead with policies to annex Palestinian land – in violation of international law – any chance of a two-state solution is now hanging by a thread.

Over a decade since Quakers first called on the UK government to take this historic step, we once again urge our leaders to play their part in bringing the 58-year occupation to an end and recognise the state of Palestine with immediate effect.'

NFPB has produced a new publication Responses to War –Contemporary Quaker Reflections to provide Friends and other readers with a resource that will help in opening up issues in relation to our peace testimony.

Glasgow Quaker Meeting House

Thirty-eight Elmbank Cres, Glasgow, was built between 1850 and 1860. During that same period 2 million people died in Ireland when the potato harvest failed. Britain was then the richest country in the world, and this tragedy should never have been allowed to happen. Quakers in Ireland did what they could to help their fellow men during this unwarranted catastrophe.

As the building neared completion, the American Civil War began, and it eventually cost the lives of 700,000 men over the issue of whether one man had the right to own another man and to deprive him of his human rights. Quakers have always been at the cutting edge of the struggle against slavery.

General Robert E.Lee, who owned 200 slaves, said, "The greatest mistake I ever made was in choosing a military career." Lee ended his days as a school teacher,

and his estate at Arlington is now a military cemetery where the 60,000 young Americans, average age 19 who died in an illegal war in Viet Nam, are commemorated. Robert McNamara, who was Secretary of Defence during the conflict, later went to speak to the Vietnamese leaders after the war. They told him,

"We were fighting for our freedom, we have been fighting the Chinese for a thousand years." McNamara later wrote a book titled, The Fog of War.

In 2003 President George W. Bush claimed that God told him to attack Iraq. No God that I am aware of would tell any American President to attack anyone. It seems to me that if the Christ teaches us to love our enemies, then dropping bombs on innocent people is simply not included in this manifesto. Quakers have consistently seen warfare as a complete violation of the Laws of God, and are 'convinced' about the validity of the central message of the New Testament. The Romans who drove their iron nails into the flesh of rabbi Yeshua failed realise that with every blow of the hammer they were beginning a process that would ultimately destroy the brutal Empire of which they and their Caesars were a part.

Glasgow Meeting House was, for a time, occupied by the Royal Artillery Club until it was purchased in 1991 by the peace-promoting Quakers of 'No Mean City'

Interfaith Glasgow Event "The Taste of Traditions" 18/5/25 St Mungo's Museum

This event brought together representatives from 5 Faiths (Islam, Christianity, Sikh, Hindu and Jewish) to discuss the importance of food, sacred meals and rituals around the sharing of food in their different traditions. The representatives were seated at 5 tables and participants were invited to join a table and then discuss the topic with the people there. There were 5 volunteers facilitators assigned to ask questions and ease discussion and they moved with the participants as they visited each faith group's offering of food and discussion.

Liz and I joined the Islamic group first and we were joined by Angela from the Buddhist community who has recently joined the Interfaith Glasgow Board.and was our facilitator Our Islamic friends talked about some of the traditions surrounding Ramadan and the reasons for fasting during the daylight hours. The fast is often broken with dates which are very nutritious: they are good to break the fast with no food or drink allowed before evening meal at sunset. Dates are very important in Islamic culture and are mentioned in the Quran 22 times and are associated with Miriam (Mary) and can guard against poison and problems of pregnancy!. Seven medjool dates are recommended as daily amount for good health!

The next table was Christianity and we were given an offering of cross buns - symbol of the crucifixion and different spices and given at Easter but we went on to discuss the importance of hospitality in churches and faith groups and projects like food banks. We also discussed the importance of Chocolate in Quaker ommunities and witness against the scourge of alcohol in the 19th century and the favourable treatment of workers in chocolate actories like Bourneville (our host had read "The Chocolate Wars"!!).

The next table were the Sikhs famed for their hospitality and the daily vegetarian meal known as the Langer instituted by the 3rd Guru as obligatory to all Sikhs to help support this endeavour.It is a symbol of equality offered to all.eating together, men, women, rich and poor. It is described as the Divine Kitchen of Equality - and in the Golden Temple in the Punjab ten of thousands meals are served each day .The samples served were tasty and very generous!

Moving on we shared a taste of Hinduism - a round ball sweet known as a Ladoo beloved of Lord Ganesh made with garam flour and milk and sugar. Our hosts had reduced some of sugar content for western taste. These sweets are often given are presents in family celebrations. At all the tables participants were asked to describe their favourite food - curry featured in a lot of answers!

The final table for us was the Jewish table where our hosts described one of the most important festivals of Judaism, the festival of the Passover and the Seder meal. There are special plates and dishes celebrating different stories of that time in exile in Egypt and different symbolic foods. A main feature is the unleavened bread, matzos which has to be baked for 18 mins exactly to prevent rising. We shared some of these with a helping of hummus and a small tasting of the traditional wine.

In the break all the hosts were encouraged to share the others food. It was very relaxed and participatory event with a lot of curiosity, enthusiasm - and much good humour - and certainly we're all left fed in mind body and spirit As usual it was very organised and we left no longer "strangers". We found out after the end that one of our Edinburgh Friends - Kate Arnot had joined us and it was good to see her.
