Special Collections

The Special Collection on **25th January** is for the **Barlinnie PlayStation**, introduced by Kate Philbrick.

The Playstation is a charity that supports children who are visiting Barlinnie Prison in Glasgow - and offers advocacy on behalf of those children to ensure that their needs are met. Members of Glasgow Quaker Meeting have been involved since Sarah Brown started the scheme 38 years or so ago.

THE CHILDREN WHO VISIT

Thousands of children visit family members in Barlinnie every year – some come only once, others we get to know over many months. Growing up when someone in your family is in

prison presents huge challenges; visiting them can be stressful and even frightening. The calm, playful atmosphere in The Playstation play area can help to make visiting as happy and family-friendly as it can be. Many carers say they would not bring the children if we were not there. Children need relationships with their fathers and other significant adults in their lives.

WHAT WE OFFER

The Playstation provides a welcoming space in the ordinary prison visits room where children can play and relax, supported by a team of trained play volunteers and two members of staff, who all work to ensure that every child's experience is positive. The play area also offers an opportunity for the children to meet others in a similar situation - Something that might not be possible otherwise.

The Playstation volunteers and committee bring varied experience and talents to support the playworkers, the organisation and each other to ensure our work can continue to support the dignity of children whose lot it is to have parents in prison. We offer child-led play to all children visiting HMP Barlinnie and we aim to contribute to reframing hopeful and positive futures for all these children.



The words on the steps Playstation decorated partly with Quaker donations in 2024 remain our guide-

The Playstation is still revelling in the stairs and the messages it gives children of their importance. Now the funding climate remains very tough and any money you can give will help to keep us going.

Quaker Housing Trust, a practical response to the housing crisis

QHT gives advice, support, loans and grants to small charitable organisations to help them provide safe, decent and affordable homes.

In the last year we funded 13 projects ranging from retrofitting affordable housing in Raasay to a small grant to enable Weston-super-Mare meeting to draw up plans to convert their meeting house to provide homes for local people.

We fund housing for people in need, often those most at risk of exclusion from mainstream housing. Projects like Ella's, which works with women who have survived trafficking or sexual exploitation. Follow this [link](#) to watch Laura tell her story.

QHT is our Quaker response to the housing crisis. We would love to see more Friends supporting our work.

Regular donations, however small, would increase the number of projects we can fund. Or we might want to leave a **legacy** for when we no longer need housing ourselves.



The history of 38 Elmbank Crescent

The impending departure of Glasgow Friends from Elmbank Crescent has reminded us of a fundraising activity undertaken when the building was acquired. Ian and Helen Macdonald (now of Wigtown Meeting) ran *The Gleniffer Press*. They published tiny books and they collaborated with the late Glasgow novelist Margaret Thomson Davis, also a member, to produce a “wee book” entitled *The Cross*. It was produced with a print run of 260. We have number 9. We wonder how many others are still around?



The book measures 3.9 cm by 5.1 cm, contains 30 pages of text set in 5 point Times and is beautifully bound.

38 Elmbank Crescent was built around 1840. Initially it was a family residence. A doctor was a resident and held his surgery there. Then it became the offices of LNER railway. After World War 2 it became the Royal Artillery Club (RAC) until the Quakers purchased it. The story starts with Eddie, a veteran of World War 1, who had been awarded a Victoria Cross for service in Gallipoli. He valued membership of the RAC and each year he and his wife had enjoyed a Christmas lunch there. When it closed, he wanted to treat his wife to a lunch somewhere else but money was short so he had to face the prospect of selling his VC. The first person who expressed interest was a Quaker whose wife ran an antiques business. Eddie was aghast – Quakers were so alien to his values so he decided not to sell the medal. When he took the medal box back, he found a bank note in it - enough to pay for the Christmas lunch. Meantime his wife had paused outside the Quaker Meeting House and been invited in for a bowl of soup. She stayed for the Wednesday meeting for worship and felt a sense of peace. When Eddie started going on about the loss of the old values he espoused and the “Ruddy weak-kneed pacifists – a motley crew who hold vigils for peace” (that’s us!), Cath was able to persuade him that ‘*It takes all kinds ...*’

Felicity and Philip Bryers (Perth Meeting)

Here are stories of three children who have visited the Playstation in Barlinnie prison: Case studies

Child A is now 5. She has been coming to the prison for around eight months. She is a nonverbal autistic child. She comes into the Playstation and loves the kitchen area. When she first came to visit Dad, she wouldn't go to see him at the table. We allowed Dad into our play area to say hello and goodbye. Eight months later she has become a bit more vocal and is engaging with her Dad a lot more. She started school in the new term and she seems to be really settling so the parents are not so worried about her going to mainstream school.

Child B is just under 2, she is at the age where she can't concentrate on anything for any length of time and wants to toss everything on the floor. Her parents try everything to keep her at the table to let her spend time with her Dad but she just won't stay. I had a meeting with the family contact team to get her a dedicated child's visit so Dad can move around with her. She now has this visit once a week, and in the larger general visits hall, where Playstation mostly operates, if we prepare some small favourite toys she will sit for at least 20 minutes now .

Child C aged 12 visits with her siblings aged 5 and ,7 .To try and maximise their time with their Dad who they can only see once a week now he is convicted, we have agreed after speaking to their Mum, that they will come into the Playstation before the visits starts, and return to the play area for 10 minutes towards the end of the visit; they really enjoy the Playstation and like to draw and play with everything we have to offer. The 12 year old is a very talented artist; she keeps an eye on the clock to ensure she keeps to the agreed times and counts time down for her younger siblings so they know when they are going to go between the Playstation and the visit table.
