Local Development Worker's Report 2025

I'm Zoe Prosser, Local Development Worker for Quakers in Scotland. I work to support the Quaker community across Scotland, from the Quakers in Wigtown (the furthest south) to the Quakers in the Shetland Islands (the very north). My role is paid for and managed by Britain Yearly Meeting (so, indirectly, by all of you).

Normally around this time of year I produce a newsletter and, separately, a report on my work. I thought that this year I would save your inboxes and combine the two.

This year has been one of unprecedented change for Quakers across Scotland, with four Quaker charities and three Area Meetings planning to lay themselves down. At the same time our Quaker communities have been incredibly brave; facing conflict, difference and change.

In this context I've attempted to help where I can and hinder as little as possible. Quakers have been innovative; sometimes a solution has been found before I've even been informed of an issue.

My role has been to provide support, encouragement, information and advice where it is sought. It was both a pleasure and an honour. I look forward to 2026.

2025 Priorities

The priorities that Friends suggested I focus on in 2025 were:

- Continue to strengthen and develop support for role holders.
- Supporting Quaker communities to be loving, inclusive and all age.
- Pointing the way to information about available resources and materials, including videos and non-traditional resources, to help Quaker Meetings and role-holders identify what they need, and developing and creating further resources where there is a need.
- Supporting the Quakers in Scotland Co-ordinating Group to work for change.

I'll use them as a structure to tell you a little bit about my work this year (so far).

1. Strengthening and Developing Support for Role Holders

This year, I've continued to support and refine our network meetings, with varied outcomes across different groups:

• Elders and Pastoral Care Friends (5 times a year): This network continues to thrive. Friends consistently report that these meetings are spiritually nourishing, practically useful, and deeply supportive. The group has become a trusted space for sharing wisdom and exploring spiritual nurture. This year we considered 5 themes or topics:

- Inductions and Training
- Supporting Friends through difference Theism and Atheism
- Quakers in Scotland Consultations
- Outreach
- In late November we will have our last meeting of the year where we plan for 2026
- Nominations Friends (quarterly): Despite the concern and strain Friends have felt around nominations, attendance of the network has been low. This indicates that we are not getting nominations support and networking right. I am meeting with the clerks of nominations for QiS and SESAM and hope that Friends who are part of the nominations network will advise me on the best way forward with this group.
- Clerks of Local Meetings (5 times a year): This network was one of the two which were newly launched in 2025. It appears that clerks and correspondent clerks from across Scotland have welcomed the opportunity to speak to one another about the challenges that they face. Interestingly a lot of what the clerks speak about have also been covered in both the elders and pastoral care networks and, occasionally, the nominations network.
- Trustees of Quaker Charities (5 times a year): This is another network that was newly launched in 2025. This is the network that has inspired the most learning for me, as I had little knowledge of many aspects of trustee's work before I started this network. It has grown into supportive and helpful community, and I think that Trustees have found value in connecting and sharing governance insights during this time of change.

Overall, role holders report increased confidence and connection, cross-Meeting collaboration has grown, and we've seen a deepening of spiritual grounding in Quaker roles.

2. Supporting Quaker Communities to be loving, inclusive and all age.

The highlight of my year when it comes to working with a loving, inclusive and all age community was facilitating a workshop for Falkirk and Polmont LM introducing Spiritual Reviews.

My daughter Ella, who has just turned 10, supported me in delivering the first exercise of the day. Falkirk and Polmont have an unusually (for Quakers) diverse range of ages and the youth and energy of the young Friends required adaptation and flexibility. The day was joyful and I was very pleased to have had the opportunity to work directly with Friends from Falkirk and Polmont.

I have worked with meetings and spoken to Friends who are concerned about how to make our community loving and inclusive in all sorts of ways. This work has resulted in discussions, workshops and lots of future plans.


3. Pointing the Way to Resources and Creating New Ones

I've continued to create and share resources through:

- Network meeting notes
- One-to-one support with role holders and Meetings who have specific questions and requests.

New Resources Developed:

- A **Safeguarding Workshop Pack** (now available for Meetings to run themselves) "Looks great and I can see myself stealing from it in some training I am developing for my AM for certain office holders" A Friend at a BYM Safeguarding Network Meeting where it was presented.
- A number of advice and consultation documents to support Friends who are working on specific tricky
 topics. This has resulted in a surprisingly interesting dive into several aspects of Scottish law around
 safeguarding, charities and a few other topics.
- A number of rough and very simply edited videos to discuss particular topics or upcoming workshops.

4. Supporting the Quakers in Scotland Co-ordinating Group to Work for Change

I've continued to support the Co-ordinating Group and its **Community Subgroup.** My role remains supportive rather than directive, and I've worked to maintain clear boundaries while offering practical help.

Highlights:

- I supported the development of a proposed new way of working for elders and pastoral care Friends in Scotland in consultation with elders and pastoral care Friends across Scotland.
- The first meeting of Quakers in Scotland after General Meeting for Scotland laid itself down was very moving. I thought particularly about Peter Christy, who was part of Options for Scotland and who sadly died last year.

Additional Work and Achievements

- Supported Friends across all Area Meetings in Scotland
- Supported Emily Provance's trip to Scotland following the Swarthmore lecture
- Attended West Scotland Friends' Gather and NSAM Residential at Pluscarden Abbey.
- FINISHED the book *Mutual Accompaniment and Creation of the Commons* by Mary Watkins which I started just after I started this role in 2021 and have been grimly plugging through (off and on) ever since. Honestly bits of it are excellent and very readable, but other bits are tough going.
- Survived two children changing schools (including one going from primary to secondary school).

Looking ahead

In terms of my priorities, we have suggested to Quakers in Scotland that my priorities remain the same except for priority number 4, which we hope Friends will agree to change to

"Supporting Quakers across Scotland (including area meetings and Quakers in Scotland) to find good ways of working within our changing structure".

This will allow for both the Quakers in Scotland Coordination Group and all other Quakers and Quaker communities who are affected by the current changes.

Whether your Quaker-related challenges can slot into my priorities or not, I hope that you will get in touch with me if there is something I might be able to help you with.
