Minutes of Local Meeting for Business, Sunday 15 January 2012

Minutes of the Local Meeting for Business held on 9 October 2011 have been circulated and they have been signed by the Clerk.

Matters Arising

• (23/11) – Update on Area Meeting Nominations Committee

Our Elders and Overseers have asked LM to suggest someone else to serve on this committee. We agree to appoint Alison Chalmers to serve in this role.

• (26/11) – Library

Anna Mitchell has offered to take on responsibility for the meeting library. She plans to go through the books and, with consultation, weed some out. She proposes making up a tray of recent and relevant books to be taken out at each meeting. She also proposes to meet with the librarians at Central Edinburgh to talk about cataloguing our books.

We thank Anna for her offer and ask her to take on this work.

• (29/11) – Meetings with politicians

David Turner reported that we have had a successful meeting, on 3 December, with Ian Murray our MP. The main topics discussed were the Millennium Goals, the Arms Trade, and Iran. Deirdre Armstrong will write a full report on the meeting in the newsletter. The group intends to meet with Jim Eadie MSP, possibly on February 25th, and will meet on Sunday 29 January to prepare. Details will go in the newsletter.

• (32/11) – Sign outside the Open Door

Chris Booth has reported that the cost of a new sign would be around £60, not including design of the artwork. He did not find a supplier willing to sell a replacement sign without the base. Sylvia Massey has asked the Open Door to find out whether their suppliers, Signbuilders, can provide the sign only to slot into the existing stand. Failing this, we agree to purchase a complete new sign with appropriate information. We ask Chris Booth, Mary Woodward and David Bell to design the artwork and take this forward.

• (20/11) – Archives

Sylvia Massey reported that minutes from 1970-76 are missing (the period when our meeting started). 1987-89 are also missing. She asks anyone who finds these or knows where they are to let her know.

We agree to dispose of our copied of Monthly Meeting and General Meeting minutes.

Pat Lucas has issued guidelines on indexing minutes, which we will attempt to follow. Sylvia agrees to continue with this work.

1/12 – Wiston Lodge Weekend

Deirdre Armstrong has reported that the dates have been booked (7-9 September) and that a deposit has been paid. We ask Kerry Oliver to take responsibility for bookings and collecting money (with advice available from Phil Noble).

We need a small group to plan the activities and we will put a notice in the newsletter asking for volunteers. One person from Children's Committee will be on this and we need two others. Elders and Overseers will be responsible for seeing that two people are found and will put a notice in the newsletter.

The Becoming Friends programme

Becoming Friends is a course devised by Woodbrooke and Quaker Life for people who would like to increase their knowledge and understanding of Quakers. It is designed both for newcomers and established Friends, can be used by both groups and individuals, and is not aimed at bringing participants into membership. The Companion's role is to accompany the person or group during their enquiry, to answer questions and direct them to sources of information, and to "be a supportive, listening presence" as they reflect on their learning. It is perfectly possible to follow the course on one's own: the material is available both in book form and online, which enables each participant to use their preferred medium for study.

What does the course consist of?

There is an introductory unit, which enables the course participants to get to know each other, set out ground rules [confidentiality, time and length of meetings, what each person is hoping to get from the course etc] and choose which unit they wish to start with. The eight self-contained units can be studied in any order:

Silence and Waiting, Experiencing Quaker Community, Faithful Diversity, The Sacred in the Everyday, Advices and Queries, Deep Roots and New Growth, Faith in Action, and Speaking of God.

Within each unit there are Distinctives, Discovery and Deepenings: what makes Quakers distinctive; finding out more about the particular topic; and going more deeply into what this means for one personally.

For example: the unit <u>Deep Roots and New Growth</u> is designed to help one find out about the roots and history of the Quaker faith and our commitment to ongoing change.

The **Distinctives** section offers an overview of Quaker history, and give examples of the lives and insights of early Quakers, talk about Quakers as a prophetic community, outline the history of Quaker structures such as Yearly Meeting and Meeting for Sufferings, and show the steady, rooted Quaker approach to putting faith into action, both now and in the past.

The **Discovery** section suggests ways of exploring this further – for example, looking at panels of the Quaker Tapestry, exploring the Quaker timeline given in the Distinctives section of the unit, talking about Quaker stories from the past or exploring Swarthmoor Hall in person, or in a 'virtual tour'.

The **Deepenings** section suggests reflecting on a person or incident from Quaker history that interests or appeals; responding to a prayer written by a contemporary American Friend; making an image for one's own rootedness in response to the image of Quakerism as a well-rooted tree, able to grow and even accept grafts; reflecting on the writings of the Quaker mystics; engaging with the Quaker discipline of waiting for the right time for action or change.

What is so great about the course?

I spent about a year and a half at Pendle Hill, the Quaker Centre for Study and Contemplation in Pennsylvania, and greatly appreciated the opportunity to develop my understanding of my own religious experience and learn from those of Quakers and non-Quakers alike. Most people are unable to take time out of their lives in this way, and don't have many opportunities to talk about their faith or explore new ideas: Becoming Friends gives people the opportunity to have these conversations.

When I first started attending Meeting I felt, and still feel very strongly, that there is often insufficient opportunity for both newcomers to Friends and long-term members and attenders to talk about their faith and learn from that of others: Friends are very good at the "Do you work? Do you have children? Where do you stay?" sort of conversations, but are less comfortable / able to talk about spiritual matters. This course offers an excellent opportunity for everyone to explore Quakerism in as much depth as they choose, and offers the opportunity to share these explorations with others, either one-to-one or in a group.

The wide range of topics, and material within each topic, means that there is 'something for everyone': and there is much that encourages one to explore and deepen one's faith. Having the material available as both a book and on line means that one can choose one's preferred way to follow the course, or dip in and out as one wishes.

What's happening in my Meeting? What's planned for the future?

Alison Burnley and Mary Woodward from South Edinburgh Meeting, [and Marilyn Higgins from Central Edinburgh] went on the 'Becoming Friends Companions' course at Swarthmoor Hall last autumn, and are facilitating 'Becoming Friends' groups within their Meetings. There is also a 'waiting list' in South Edinburgh, and it is hoped that a second group will start meeting some time over the winter. If people are unable to come to a group meeting, they could follow the course on their own and either meet regularly with a companion or arrange to meet as and when they felt the need.

We would be delighted to give other Meetings further information about the Becoming Friends course, and any help they might want to enable them to set up groups for themselves.

What do I know about how this is used in other Meetings?

I know of several other Meetings where the course has been used by the whole Meeting as part of their monthly study sessions, while others have groups of both newcomers and established Friends, as well as running the course for enquirers.

How to look at the free demo of the Becoming Friends online course

- 1. Go to the Woodbrooke Moodle site at http://moodle.woodbrooke.org.uk
- 2. You don't need to log in, as the free demo allows 'guest user' access.
- 3. Scroll down to the bottom of the main site page and click on <u>Becoming Friends</u> in the course categories list.
- 4. On the next screen, click on <u>Becoming Friends: Living & learning with Quakers free demonstration course</u>
- 5. When prompted to log in, click on login as a guest.
- 6. The next screen will be the Becoming Friends demo.

Bed & Breakfast Scheme

This was set up many years ago to generate funds for Victoria Terrace Meeting House, and at the same time provide opportunities to meet people from Quaker meetings further afield. The scheme provides relatively low cost accommodation in Friend's homes. We suggest a figure for the donation. Requests for accommodation mostly come from elsewhere in the UK, but occasionally from abroad.

The scheme is operated very simply and can almost always be organised through email communication. As current co-ordinator Alison Perks (Edinburgh Central Meeting) receive requests and forwards terms & conditions to the enquirer. If they wish to go ahead and book on that basis, Alison then circulates the host group to establish availability. The allocated host's contact details are then sent to the enquirer to get in touch directly to make the necessary arrangements.

Alison is looking for additional willing hosts. It is not a huge commitment as requests probably average two a month, duration of stay is a maximum of three or four nights, and it is obviously acceptable to refuse any particular request. So far I have not had to turn anyone away! So here is an opportunity for you to offer hospitality and meet new people.

The eradication of prejudices of bigotry, Tribalism, Classism, Nationalism and Racism. The removal of oppression, exploitation and injustice.


To be civilized is to be fair and kind.
