Summary of South Edinburgh Local Meeting for Worship for Business 5 June 2022

Full minutes have been circulated by email. Please get in touch if you would like a printed copy.

- In general, we are happy with our current arrangement of holding Meeting for Worship in 3 ways on Sunday mornings (Zoom, Open Door, and garden) and on the first Thursday evening of the month. Our elders and pastoral care group will consider holding an occasional Meeting for Worship in person only, as some Friends expressed that these feel quite different to a blended meeting.
- We will ask Zoe Prosser, Local Development Worker for Scotland, to facilitate a RESTORE (Recognise, Empathise, Safety, Trauma, Opportunity, Relationships, Engagement) workshop in the Autumn.
- We will commence holding Meeting for Worship to Witness for Peace in Princes Street Gardens on the same days as Meeting for Worship is held at Faslane. The next one will take place at 10.30 am on Sun 26 June, at the site of the planned conscientious objector memorial, which is to the east of the fountain at the west end of Princes St Gardens). Future dates are 25th Sep, 13 Nov.

Our next Meeting for Business is scheduled after Meeting for Worship on Sunday 14 August.


Our pioneering neighbours, the Royal Edinburgh Hospital.

The latest all-colour Scottish Friend, whose production standards raise the bar worryingly for Quaker editors, has an item on The Retreat. This pioneering York psychiatric hospital is closing after 300 years. But we should not forget that the Royal Edinburgh Hospital was close behind, and espoused many of the same principles.

The Retreat opened in 1796. William Tuke, local Quaker tea merchant, was influenced by the death of Quaker Hannah Mills in 1790 in inhuman conditions in a new local asylum. She had been admitted with 'melancholy'.

The death of poet Robert Ferguson in Edinburgh's Bedlam in 1774 was said to have triggered his physician Andrew Duncan to launch a campaign to build a better place in 1792. The hospital opened in 1813 on a 4-acre site on the West side of Morningside Road, previously a mansion, just beyond the modern Sainsbury's. This was East House, demolished to make way for the housing and shops we see now in 1896. West House had opened for poorer patients in 1842, and remains as Mackinnon House on the main hospital site.

The work undertaken for wealthy patients in East House moved to the very grand new Craighouse Hospital in 1894. This splendid building, just above 16th century Craig House, is 20 mins walk from the Open Door along Balcarres St. It was a Napier University building for 20 years, now being redeveloped as housing. The whole site is impressive, with walks and views around about.



OS map 1877-85. Development has barely crossed the Jordan Burn – perhaps because of the toll. So no building yet at the site of the Open Door next to Morningside Rd station. That had just opened in 1884. The East House of the Royal Ed survived just over a decade longer before being replaced by tenements and shops.




