






A girl and a boy







Bernard Sindall's *Girl in a Hat* (1972) stands confidently, casually, coolly surveying the central campus of Birmingham University. She wears only a hat, perhaps from the suffragist era. 150 years ago, in 1869, the 'Edinburgh Seven' became the first women to enter a British university, other than through subterfuge. It's a torrid tale, but they were finally awarded honorary degrees at this year's medical graduation ceremony (60% women).

Her pose strongly echoes Donatello's bronze *David* (1440s), which was apparently the first freestanding male nude since the classical period. He is more languid. That's Goliath's head he has his foot on, with feathers from the helmet running high up his inner right thigh, but it was proudly and prominently exhibited in Florence in the 15th century.
