
Anything at all encouraging to say about climate - or anything, really?

Our August edition featured comments on Quakers from STC. Rosamond Robertson has been reading more.

Mariner by theologian Malcolm Guite, is a long but fascinating account of the life of Samuel Taylor Coleridge, centring on *The Rhyme of the Ancient Mariner*. Guite is an outstanding theologian and his sonnets are quite breathtaking in their beauty and depth. Formerly Chaplain to Girton College Cambridge, he is a priest, an academic, writes sonnets, but also plays the guitar in a surprisingly non-establishment type of church and resembles a Hobbit.
