Local Meeting for Business will be held at 1pm on **Sun 29 Nov**. Same link as Meeting for Worship.



For something de-stressing and also very musical, try this Korean-French family, who have quickly attracted a broad international following. **Isaac and Nora** are 12 and 9, and play music and sing with their father, filmed by their mother, mostly in home recordings, in a sequence of videos posted over 3 or 4 years on YouTube (434,000 followers) and Facebook (1.3 million followers). So comfortably real, with talent, dedication and obvious enjoyment, hitting just the right note for the era.

This Classical Life: New ideas of all types, not just classical, from infectious saxophonist Jess Gillam. 
