Singing Group – meets every first Tue, this month at **3.30 pm** on Tue 2nd, at Victoria Terrace.


Coffee – at Rachel Frith's house on first and third Thursdays, from 10.15 am, limited to 10 Friends.

Warm museums for the winter weather

Two short free exhibitions in free museums, and one paid longer one





Alison Watt, a Portrait Without Likeness, at the National Portrait Gallery.

Till 9th Jan. Beautiful recreations of single objects from paintings by Allan Ramsay. Each with a story, or thoughts.

The Typewriter Revolution at the National Museum of Scotland

Till 17th April. Hidden away at the West end of Level 3, but telling a fascinating history. Typewriters began to become available in significant numbers in the 1890s, around the same time as bicycles. The rapid technological development, the jobs that came from making them, the impact on office life, and on jobs for women, are mentioned. And their enabling effect on the Votes for Women campaign. There is an excellent history and miscellany online at https://bit.ly/3CsOgNI but there's more in the display. If you search 'collections' you will see photos of the more than 100 that the museum holds.





Surgeons Hall Museum. This fascinating if sometimes gruesome place has had a makeover, so if you haven't been for a few years, take your visitors at Christmas. Various discounts. At the moment there is a temporary exhibition of models used to teach anatomy and explain dissection. Often these, and sometimes actual dissection, were open for public viewing, partly to allay fears about dissection, and partly for the income generated.
