## Minutes of Local Meeting for Business held on 27 October 2019

## 1. Opening Worship

We heard from Quaker Faith & Practice 23.36 – Meeting for Sufferings' Statement of Intent on Racism, 1988 – on seeing that of God in every single person.

We were 13 present – meeting straight after Meeting for Worship was better!

## 2. Minutes of our 25 August 2019 meeting – Matters Arising:

- QPSW Call for Expressions of Interest in hosting a Climate Action Field Worker We heard that East Lothian LM has bid for a post being established in SE Scotland and two local Meetings in West of Scotland AM also applied.
- Quaker Week Display was in Open Door window for two weeks from 29 September
- Kirsteen Powell has a new job. Simon Warr is Operations Manager at Open Door.

## 3. Reviewing After Words

We had decided in 2018 to discontinue the time set aside after the end on Meeting for Worship for sharing ideas that had not made it into ministry. We discussed "Is this working OK? or will we adopt another idea which enables friends to share greetings?"

Esther reported on discussions among Elders and Overseers – in particular their wish to hold absent friends and others in the light.

We heard that North Edinburgh LM meets monthly for 45 minutes in silence followed by half an hour of open discussion. Many of us however value a full hour of worship.

We agreed to ask that when closing the Meeting our Elders / Overseers enquire after absent friends and for any situation to be held in the light; and for this short time to be strictly time limited so that – together with Notices – this ends by 11.45am.

#### 5. Date of Next Meeting


We agreed to meet again for Worship for Business on Sunday 26 January after Meeting for Worship.

Please note that living some way out of Edinburgh doesn't make you unsuitable, if there are reasonable transport links.


