

Report on the East Scotland Area Meeting Feb 2025

The East Scotland Area Meeting was held via Zoom on Saturday 15th February 2025.

Robin Waterston was Clerk and Alice Curteis was Assistant Clerk.

We reviewed our statement of numbers as reported to Britain Yearly Meeting. This is more or less unchanged since last year.

We reviewed our financial position, which seems to be steady as she goes. During her presentation Treasurer Pam Brunt on the Zoom subtitles was renamed Rembrandt. She is of course an artist with the figures.

A welcome was given to our new Members Gavin Waterston and Danni Orr, both to be part of St Andrews Local Meeting.

We approved the nominations of Bel Ingham as an Elder for Dundee Local Meeting and Craig Wilson as a Pastoral Friend for Dundee Local Meeting. We were particularly happy to note that both the new Members and the new Role Holders are younger Members of our Meeting.

We discussed our priorities for the Parliamentary Engagement Officer and Working Group for 2026-2028. Richard Raggett and Carolyn Burch introduced the discussion paper addressing this. With the Scottish Parliamentary elections next spring, there is an opportunity for our Parliamentary Engagement Officer, Sarah Komashko, to be involved in discussing the parties' manifestos.

Important points were scapegoating, economic injustice, the use of social media, and the climate emergency. An important part of this work is to engage with MSPs as human being doing a difficult job and letting them know we notice it and appreciate it when they follow their consciences, and work across parties where possible.

Richard and Carolyn's significant experience, knowledge and skill in this area was evident and much appreciated.

Meeting for Sufferings March 1st 2025

Meeting for Sufferings held on 26/2/25 (Pre-Meeting evening session online) and Saturday March 1st at Friends House and online.

The pre-Meeting Zoom session on Wednesday evening allowed time for discussion on Minutes received from Area Meetings on matters covering the Use of Religious Language, the Israel-Gaza war and Quaker Concern for Over Population. This Meeting was attended by around forty five Friends.

The March 1st full session was attended by around ninety Friends, spread evenly on Zoom and in Friends House. I attended in person. After Business matters the morning was taken up with a number of reports. Sufferings heard the annual report from the Quaker Committee for Christian and Interfaith Relations. We were reminded that there have been many differences between groups involved with this work but it was vital to continue peace building and focusing on what we can do together. Work was on going on antisemitism and Reparations.

Our Friend, Adwoa Burnley, Clerk of Yearly Meeting then reported on the agenda for YM 2025 and urged Friends to encourage others to consider attending. She asked for discussions on "...discipline and expectations" relating to the Quaker business method. YM 25 will "look out to the state of the world".

Sufferings then heard the Triennial Report from the Quaker Housing Trust. The Trust was established in 1967 in response to a housing crisis to give Quaker money, on behalf of Quakers, to local housing projects that Friends would wish to support. The period covered by the report has seen help give to sixteen separate projects in Scotland, Wales and England.

Finally before lunch the Meeting heard from BYM Trustees. Trustees have sent a Minute to the Book of Discipline Revision Committee requesting text on the spiritual roots of giving. Should encouraging financial donations be a duty of Area Meetings? Work is being done by BYM staff to take this further.

Following lunch the afternoon session time was spent looking at preparing for our new continuing Yearly Meeting sessions. Sufferings considered the representation and financial support for those attending. Funding arrangements for Sufferings would continue for YM but Area Meetings would be asked to help if possible.

Oliver Robertson from BYM staff reported next on work being done on the climate emergency by looking at the involvement of Living Witness and Quaker Support for Climate Action.

The afternoon session concluded with consideration of Quaker reaction to new Police powers regarding protest and demonstration. A number of concerns and examples were offered by Friends and it was agreed that this issue would be returned to for further discernment by Meeting for Sufferings.

Alastair McIntosh, 1 August 2006 – Spiral of Violence

My youth was during the Vietnam era, and I have to confess that as a hawkish young man I found war rather exciting. I remember going to Aberdeen University and seeing a poster that said, "War is not good for children and other living things," and it irritated me for its naivety.

But there were rather a lot of posters like this, and, worked on by my valiant if few-and-far-between girlfriends, I gradually started to think in new ways that chipped away at the armour round my heart.

One of the most influential poster voices was a Brazilian archbishop called Helder Camara. He'd come out with things like - why is it that "When I give food to the poor they call me a saint. [But] when I ask why the poor have no food they call me a communist"?

I wonder how many of today's politicians realise that when talking about the "spiral of violence" in the Middle East, they're drawing on Camara, who published a little book by that name in 1971?

He observed that violence builds up at three levels in a society. Primary violence is the everyday effect of structurally ingrained social injustice. This generates secondary violence - the revolt of the oppressed. And that in turn

provokes tertiary violence - repression by the powerful to secure their privileged position. And so the spiral of violence tightens.

After years of being out of print, Archbishop Camara's little book is now going on the web. It culminates with an "appeal to youth", saying that wars happen because of the egotism of adults, and he urges the youth to, "provoke discussions [and] force people to think and take up a position: let it be uncomfortable, like truth, demanding, like justice."

Whether Lebanese or Israeli, war is not good for children and other living things, and the children are always innocent. Camara's last word is for them: "With you I must remain young in my soul," he said, "and keep the hope and love I need to help all humanity."


