Area Meeting by Telephone 4th December 2012

How good it is in dark, snowy December, not to have to travel for Area Meeting! And for us islanders, a real treat to "get to" AM without having to allocate a whole weekend to it. Some 24 Friends gathered around kitchen tables and Meeting House phones and joined the gathered silence after a short automated chorus of "Here is....X" and "Here is....Y"! In spite of the early lack of a hearing aid and a number of doubts about whether the mute button had been pressed or not, we generally heard each other very well and the procedure worked smoothly.

After remembering with affection our Friend Ian Richardson of Glasgow Meeting, his tireless work for peace and his regular welcoming presence at Meeting, we moved to consideration of a major problem facing West Scotland AM at the moment - our inability to find anyone willing or able to serve as Clerk from the beginning of 2013. The matter is currently with trustees, but we spent a while holding the issue, and trustees, in the Light. A number of reflections came out of this period of worship, and these will be passed to trustees.

We received another application for membership, heard the report of Sarah Brown's and Malcolm Crosby's visit to Zem Moffat of Glasgow Meeting, and joyfully welcomed Zem into membership. We then, rather less joyfully, considered a list of some ten or so Friends, not seen for many years, of whom Overseers had not been able to find any trace. In fact, the publication of the list elicited useful information about possible connections five of them. This information will be followed up by Overseers, but since nothing further was known about Jacqueline Edwards, Peter Hardern, June Maxwell, Alan Spencer, Lisa Occleston or Andrew Muirhead, the decision was taken to terminate their memberships, with the understanding of course that if they return at some point in the future, their membership could be willingly restored.

We considered two possible budgets for 2013, one more generous than the other, though in fact both come to a total in excess of what we have currently given to AM in 2012. Friends, if we can, we need to give more, if we wish to do the work we want to do and to be able to send Friends to conferences and training weekends. We agreed to send an Elder and an Overseer to the Eldership and Oversight Conference in April, and our new deputy Registering Officer, Billy Johnstone, to the Conference of Registering Officers in March, both taking place at Woodbrooke. We are also pleased to be able to send three young people to Junior Yearly Meeting in April.

Reports from Margaret Munro on Quaker Life Representative Council and from Dumfries Meeting on their positive experience of "cluster gathering" had already been circulated, and we also heard the happy news that Glasgow Meeting have managed to raise the remaining £6000 to pay for the roof repairs. Finally we noted terms of service which are coming to an end and for which new names are needed, we released Jenny Faulkner, with our grateful appreciation, from her service as an Elder, and were pleased to appoint Janette Walkinshaw as Assistant Clerk and Lindesay Burton as Membership Administrator.

After the signing of the Minutes and a further few moments of silence we said our farewells and "departed", to another chorus of "X... and Y.... have left".
