News and Opportunities in 2024:

Resources for the General Election

Colleagues who are involved in parliamentary work have put together a pack to prepare meetings for the general election. It will be available <u>here</u> by next week.

It will include:

- An **election guide** for individuals, groups and meetings on the upcoming general election. It gives an overview of some key issues for Quakers in Britain, suggesting questions that Quakers may wish to ask their parliamentary candidates. It has advice about ways to engage your meeting and wider community in the election.
- A template email for individuals to adapt and send to their local parliamentary candidates.
- Local meetings can order up to three printed copies of the election guide for their meeting. They can also order up to five **greetings cards** to send to local candidates on behalf of the meeting. These resources are free but are strictly for local meetings (not individuals) and limited in numbers.

Eventually there will also be resources for staff and volunteers working with children and young people, and a Quaker briefing for parliamentary candidates, which Friends can refer to if they have meetings with candidates.

Are you planning a George Fox 400 event?

This could be a great way to celebrate your meeting and talk about Quakers and Quakerism. Ellie McCarthy is our new George Fox 400 coordinator, she works part time to coordinate Friend's events and plans.

Ellie has shared the George Fox 400 narrative, it is something that might be shared with Friends news agencies or other organisations:

2024 marks the 400th anniversary of the birth of George Fox, the best known of the group of men and women who founded Quakerism.

Fox made a point of living with integrity, acting against injustice and building a faith community that practiced what they preached, looking for that of God in everyone.

Quakers through history continued to live out these values, playing an important role in the abolition of slavery, modelling fair employment practices and working for humanitarian and social change.

Today, Quakers in Britain work for peace, climate and social justice. Quaker communities create spaces for people of all faiths and none to explore their beliefs in quiet stillness.

Following the example of George Fox and early Friends, Quakers continue to live and work by testimonies to peace, simplicity, truth, integrity and equality.
